FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



The oral traditions were the 613 man-made Jewish laws that explain the laws God gave to Moses on Mount Sinai. These laws were supposed to be like a fence around the divine laws, protecting them from accidentally being violated. The oral traditions pertain to all parts of life and included everything from what foods could eaten to what was an acceptable sacrifice to God.

Some of the Jews believed the oral traditions were a blueprint to holiness. Following these laws guaranteed you were holy and not following them (even if you didn't know what they were) meant you were a sinner. This sort of reasoning put holiness out of the reach of the ordinary Jews. Most of them work long hours to feed their families and didn't have time to study the laws. Because they didn't know the laws, they couldn't follow them. Because they couldn't follow the laws, they couldn't be holy. So their sufferings and sorrows were the just punishments for their sinfulness, according to this way of thinking.

The rich were the only ones who had the time to learn all 613 laws. They believe their comfortable lifestyle was proof God was pleased with them. They thought God not only rewarded them for their holiness but also would give them the place of honor in the heavenly reign.

Jesus turns things around in today's Gospel. All the ones he says are blessed or holy are the ones people normally considered sinners. The poor who are sorrowing, or lonely, or persecuted are the ones who will be rewarded, not the rich and powerful. What's even more astonishing is that each reward Jesus mentions has something to do with the reign of God.

The Jews sometimes pictured the reign as a new promised land where God would "fill the hungry with good things" and where "the sorrowing would find comfort." Those who inherit this kingdom would "see God" and would be known as "children of God." So we understand that Jesus is saying in today's gospel that God will give the positions of honor in the heavenly reign to the poor and the powerless, not the rich.

Finally, Jesus tells us that simply following laws is not enough to please God. The beatitude about the single-hearted pertains to those who serve God because they want to and not because they want a reward. In Jesus' day, some people observed the laws because they wanted others to see how holy they were. They were looking for applause and were not single hearted.

Are we single hearted? Why do we obey the commandments? Are we looking for a reward (for

example, heaven, a good reputation, etc.)? Would we act differently if there wasn't a life after death?

For us here at St. Benedict, our Annual Black History Month begins next weekend. From then until the end of February, we will be hearing from various members of our St. Benedict family. As well, there will be weekly inserts with information and material highlighting the unique contributions of the African American community to our nation's life and history. This is indeed a time to thank God for the many gifts that have characterized the African American presence in our country.

One of those gifts to our local community is the work and presence of Congresswoman Barbara Lee, who serves as our representative to Congress, specifically in the House of Representatives, serving California's 13th Congressional District.

In the midst of last month's Ghost Ship Fire in the Fruitvale District, I was asked on-scene by Congresswoman Lee's field representative Tasion Kwamilele if I had received her invitation to represent District 13 as Barbara Lee's guest at the 65th Annual National Prayer Breakfast, held this Thursday, February 2nd. When I returned to the rectory that afternoon, there it was.

I accepted the invitation, and will be joined by Oakland clergy Rev. Ken Chambers (Westside Missionary Baptist Church) and Rabbi David Cooper (Kehilla Community Synagogue). I'm leaving on Monday afternoon and returning Friday afternoon. I am hoping to visit the African American Museum of History and Culture as well as the monument to Dr. Martin Luther King on the Capitol Mall.

I lived in Washington, DC, for four months during my sabbatical in 2009, so I am hoping to visit old friends and eat at some of my favorite places.

I also know that the president will be at the Prayer Breakfast on Thursday. I promise to be on my best behavior and will pray for him and his family.
